That in compliance with the order of the Board of the 1st Inst informations were given against the Woman Anne Jones for deceiving her children and leaving them chargeable on the Rates of the Union. She was arrested by the Police on the 9th Inst. and brought up for trial before the Magistrates at Petty Sessions on Thursday last, where she was convicted of the offence and sentenced to a fortnight's imprisonment in the County Jail.
