

Letter from the Poor Law Commissioners dated 17th February 1870 enquiring whether the Woman Elizabeth Lawless and her children have arrived at the Workhouse as yet from the Nalsall Union.

Ordered That the Commissioners be informed that no account has been received of the parties since the date of their last communication on the subject.

Letter from W. H. Gregory Esq. M.P., dated 11th February 1870 stating that he has had much pleasure in presenting to the House of Commons the Bill adopted by this Board relative to the re-organization of the Valuation Department.

Letter from Collector Gullbraith dated 19th February 1870, explaining the cause of the backward state of his collections; that he had held 12 offices through his

his District in the month of December last, but that in consequence of the low price of Corn he received only a sum of £8.4.10⁰ up to the first fortnight in January, and that he did not wish to have recourse to extreme measures, or put parties to cost who had previously paid him so regularly, and altho the amount as yet lodged is smaller than usual, still, he is confident that collection will be completed in good time, adding that he would have attended before the Board this day but had to go to Gort on important business.

The consideration of the foregoing was postponed to next meeting, and the Clerk directed to require Mr. Gullbraith's attendance, and give the Board a further explanation as to the past and present state of his collection.

Letter from a Woman named Mary Kennedy dated 19th February 1870, stating that her daughter (Mary Brady aged 12 years) who had been hired out of the House as servant by a man named Egan in Longwood was not properly treated while in his employment, and that he had not paid her wages and requesting that she might be received back again into the Workhouse.

The Board having called all the parties before them, and enquired into the case directed the girl to return to her service (her employer being willing to take her back) and recommended Egan to pay the three quarters wages due to her.

The Master submitted a piece of Flannel received from the Contractor which upon examination with "Sample" was duly approved of.

The Clerk laid before the Board a copy of the proposed "Irish Land Bill" forwarded by Mr. Gregory M.P.

Relieving Officer Reitham was directed to make enquiries as to the circumstances under which a boy named Michael Reitham (lately hired out to service) had left his employment as he has this day applied for and obtained admission to the Workhouse

Ellen Stanton, charged on the Punishment Book with assaulting an inmate named Eliza Coppington having been called before the Board the Master was directed to have her summoned for this offence before the Magistrates at next Petty Sessions.

A Letter was received from Ellen Stanton complaining of harsh treatment she received in the Workhouse but the Board declined to notice the document in question

Upon the application of a man named John Burke, the Board ordered him the clothes which belonged to his wife at the time of her death in the Workhouse.

The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief, were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Books.
