House, as abt of a claim made by the Hon. Sec. for the sum of £1.12.0 being the amount expended by him, in the purchase of Stamps and Stationery, for the past 13 years. The Committee added that "they regretted to find the Board of Guardians declined to sanction the unanimous vote of the Committee, for an increase of Steward to their Med. Officer, and that they have directed their Hon. Sec. to forward Copies of the vote and this resolution to the Local Government Board for their consideration."

The Board directed payment of the Rent and Paters Salary, but postponed to a later Board, the payment of the claim made by the Hon. Sec.
Sanitary Inspector Lally reported

That he had ten Occupiers, in Mr Donalds Lane Cross Street & N Gate Street. A Thoms, summoned to last Petty Sessions, for having their premises in a filthy condition, and that an Order was made in each case, that the Deft do abate the nuisance within 10 days; that he will again visit the several premises, and ascertain if the Magistrates' order has been complied with. That he (the San. Inspector) stated to the Court, the great want of Sewers to the rear of those Houses (as set forth in his report of the 30th August last) and on the same day also attended a meeting of the Disp. Committee, and urged upon them the necessity of having those Sewers constructed, but so far as he could learn, nothing definite has been done; that he now again reports, that in his opinion, it is impossible for the want of proper Sewage, that those poor people can have their Gardens & Houses in a clean or healthy state.
