Sanitary Sub-Officer Reekham produced a Return of the Cases in which he had made a second inspection of premises after the expiration of the time specified in the Notices. The result being that nearly all the Occupiers have complied with the terms thereof, but certain Owners in Longwood require to have Screens constructed.

Ordered that the Executive Sanitary Officer prepare and get Notices served under Sec 10 of the Sanitary Act of 66 - upon the Owners in question.

The Subject of making arrangements for Dr. Burkes attendance in the Meeting Disp<sup>y</sup> District for the purpose of vaccination having been taken into consideration - Dr. Burdie reads an extract from a letter of the Local Gov<sup>t</sup> Board approving - under the previous Circulars, the Council passed by the Guardians at the Meeting of the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst. The Board accordingly agreed to allow Dr. Burkes a fee of £2 a day for his services on the occasion, and arranged with him that he would attend at Houghwell on Monday and at Althorpe on Friday next and directed the Clerk to communicate with the R<sup>d</sup> Clergymen requesting they would be pleased to announce to their Congregations on tomorrow (Sunday) the fact of Dr. Burkes intended visit and also earnestly wish that they would thus assist the Board in carrying out the provisions of such a Sanitary Act in their respective localities.
