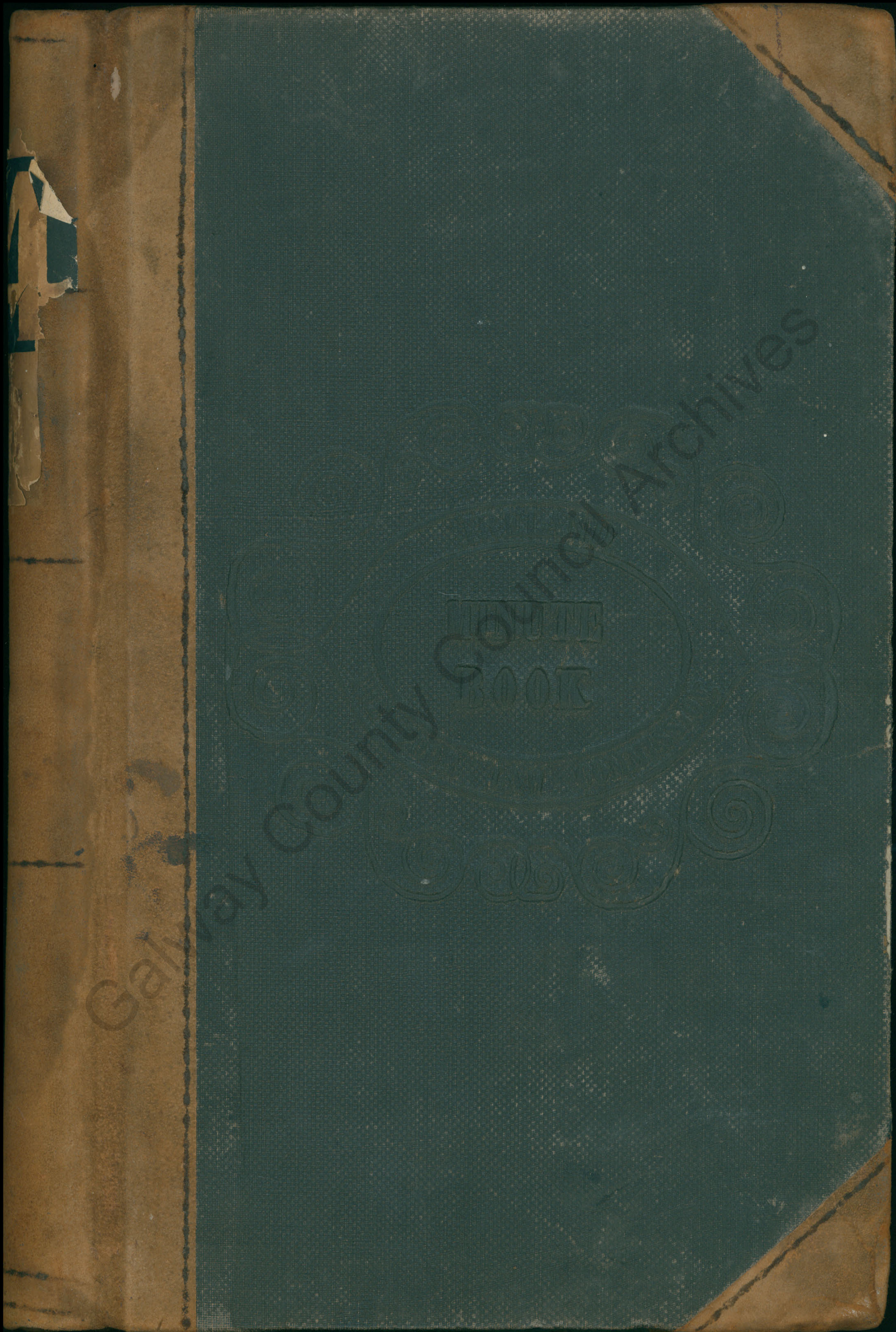

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

Letter from Rev John Larkin P.P. dated 5th August 1875 drawing attention to the case of a family named Spain resident in Wexford to whom a sum of 8^s 6^d weekly for out-door relief had been granted by the Board, while only 5^s 6^d weekly were allowed them by the Rel^y Officer, requesting that this matter be investigated, and also that the relief outside be continued for some time longer as he has got a promise that some of the children will be received into an Industrial School.

(A letter dated 13th Inst, was also read from the Rev Gentleman stating that as this matter has been since arranged by the Rel^y Officer, he trusts no further action will be taken thereon.)

Rel^y Officer Taylor having been called before the Board, and his attention drawn to the foregoing stated that he had arranged some time ago with Mr Moore of Wexford to supply the families namely, Roger Spain and Winifride Spain and children with Bread, Tea, Sugar &c to the amount of 8^s weekly and paid him at this rate but lately ascertained that they had only got 5^s 6^d weekly and that he thereupon paid them the extra sum to which the parties were entitled namely £2:4:0 and produced a receipt for same.

The Board postponed the consideration of the foregoing till next meeting and directed the Clerk to communicate with Mr Moore in the mean time and obtain from him an explanation as to the cause of this mistake in the issuing of relief to the family referred to.

Upon the application of the Schoolmaster the Board granted him a fortnight's leave of absence (when the Hon^{ble} Nurse returns) the Master consenting to discharge his duties and also allowed the Clerk - subject to the approval of the Local Govt Board - the sum of £20 for his services under the Publ^y Works Act for the year 1874.

A Form having been received from The Treasury to be filled up, respecting Contributions in lieu of Rates upon government property in this Union the Clerk was directed to obtain further particulars as to the tenements referred to.
