Letter from L^r Leonard dated 15th Oct 1875 stating that the 2 skilled Thieves left on Wednesday last and that he has placed the late Rel^y Officer and Carmon the Van Driver in Charge of the Hospital, which he observes

has been thoroughly disinfected as have also been the clothing and Bedding.

The Board deemed that one man Gynn, would be able to take charge of the Hospital and be accountable for the property therein, the other party to be discharged his services not being required.

The Consulting Sanitary Officer reported

That with reference to the matter referred to him at last meeting for his opinion he considers it would be highly imprudent to transfer to this healthy District a mass of recently infected clothing and Bedding tho' they may have been submitted to the process of fumigation — that in effectual fumigation a great deal depends in the utmost care and vigilance to prevent any portions retaining any of its infecting element, and where a large quantity of clothing is undergoing the process a portion here and there may readily escape fumigation.

That it might be prudent to refrain the Hospital for a few months longer but the disease would reappear, particularly when as is well known hardly a month has elapsed since the occurrence of the last case of Small Pox in the District referred to.

The Board having taken the foregoing into consideration

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agreed to give up possession of the Hospital on the 1st of November next, but as regards the disposal of the clothing and Bedding a division took place 3 Guardians voted for having these articles brought into the W. House and stored in the Iron Hospital while 5 voted to have all the articles of clothing and Bedding burned and consumed on the Hospital premises in Liffordy.

The General Iron Bedsteads, Kitchen and Cooking utensils were ordered to be taken into the W. House and the Rel^d Officer Lally with Gynn to carry out the decision of the Board regarding the clothing and Bedding.

Sub Sanitary Inspector Paskham having produced a list of tenements in Liffordy for which the owners neglected to have sewers constructed, after the expiration of the time specified in the notice served on each Mr Keller was ordered to be employed for the purpose of preparing a specification of the sewers which the Board intend to get constructed recovering the expense from these parties hereafter.
