That they accordingly walked up to Mr. Reekham's House but he happened to be absent at the time, and they proceeded to the Workhouse the poor man being helped on by his wife and son. Upon arrival at the Workhouse gate, they called upon the Porter and he assisted the deceased over to Hospital where the nurse immediately administered him some Stimulants, and messengers were forthwith despatched for the Priest, and the Doctor each of whom attended without delay and paid him all attention but being so much exhausted previous to admission he died at Six O'clock the same evening.

The Widow of Maher, who appeared before the Board stated, that the Lodging House Keeper prevented her calling in the Dispensary Doctor to attend him, neither would he allow the Workhouse Van to be sent for to take the poor man from the Lodging House to the Workhouse Hospital.
