I asked Denis Quinn how he proposed to bring his Wife home, he said it was Market Day, and that he would get a Cart from the Neighbourhood in town, that he had some bundles of Rags to dispose of and that he should go out. I remonstrated with him to no purpose as he was bent on going and taking his Wife with him.
