That as no new Cases of Fever at Dumbrien had come under his notice since his last Report, and the Services of the Nurse dispensed with he did not think it necessary trouble the Board with further particulars as all the Cases were progressing most favourably and are continuing to do so. However he found on visiting the District with Dr. Woodhouse on Monday last two new Cases which had occurred amongst the infected families, but as yet, it has spread no further. That he considers the House of James Scully Dumbrien totally unfit for human habitation 7th. Charles of Leins and 11 great Sulphuric Acid will suffice for disinfecting.
