Circular from The Local Govt Board dated 15<sup>th</sup> January 1881 requiring a satisfied return of the progress realised in the Workhouse on the first Saturdays in the months of January and July of the Year 77. 78 & 79.

Letter from Same dated 19<sup>th</sup> January 1881 enclosing copy of a report received from Dr Leonard McNeill to the outburst of Measles in the Electoral Division of Cappanish and Kiltalla and inquiring if the Relieving Officer has distributed the same as directed on the 8<sup>th</sup> inst. Hoping that every effort should be made to check the progress of the disease. With reference to the foregoing. Directions had been given to the San<sup>y</sup> Sub Officer to supply lime but at present on account of the state of the weather there is a difficulty in obtaining an adequate supply.

M Lally having been called before the Board and his attention drawn to the Medical Officer's report stated that he had procured a Cart of Lime which on Thursday last he distributed in the villages of Ballyn, Gorteen and Ballyglaf.
