Letter from The Local Government Board dated 18<sup>th</sup> May 1887, referring to the Case of Col<sup>l</sup> Officer Harniss, and stating that having regard to the intimation made to prevent his obtaining lodging in a Central part of the District they will not object to his residing at present in Keltella Chapel Division, but that he must attend each Wednesday at Athymon Dispensary and Friday at Gortach from 12 to 3 o'clock.

Townsend was ordered to be communicated with as regards obtaining the supply of Water from Gort Street and the probable cost thereof, the question of the Water Closets for the Infirmary was postponed until the Water is got in from town. The painting was approved of and directions given to the architect for a Contractor to execute same. The Board to provide Pils and Colours, the apportionment of the part of the report relative to sheeting the Iron Hospital was postponed until the effect of the Summer heat therein is ascertained.

Having got the several Articles aforesaid, your Committee recommend that the following be condemned and struck off the Books as unserviceable namely

If the Board think well of disposing of the old Blankets, as on a former occasion by giving a few pairs to some of the poor people outside, it might be an advantage to all parties.

The attention of your Committee having been drawn to the small Store room next to the Matron's Room they recommend that a door way be opened between the two Rooms and some of the Shelving removed; this will be an accommodation to the Matron in arranging the made up Clothing.
