Letter from The Local Government Board dated 26 August 1881 transmitting Communication received from Mr. Malachy Lally drawing attention to the inconvenience caused to the poor people of the Glenties District in consequence of the inconvenient position of the Relieving Officer Hanniffy's present residence and to the circumstances that he had been directed by Dr. Roughey to take up his abode in the Central part of the District, and requesting the Guardians observations thereon.

The Board having called the relieving Officer before them explained that he has been unable as yet to obtain a residence in a Central part of the District in consequence as he believes of intimidation being brought to bear upon the parties who otherwise would be willing to accommodate him.

Up to this the Board are fully satisfied with the manner in which the Relieving Officer has discharged his duties, and no complaints have been brought under their notice, and the Board learn from him that he regularly holds an office each Wednesday at Ceshmon Dispensary and on Friday at Gurteen where he receives applications for Relief and in order to facilitate matters, printed handbills to this effect have this day been ordered to be circulated thro the District, there may be a difficulty in obtaining a competent person for the office who resides in the Centre of the District.
