We learned on last Sunday that Bernard McCabe used filthy language to the inmates of the House. Called Maria Rielly a registered whore, and said she went out on previous Saturday to earn as such! He knocked down Ellen Kearns and attempted to violate her person, he beat Mary Martin and

Knocked her to violate her person and offered her half a Crown as the wages of sin. Margaret Hemmiff, he twice laid hold of and asked her to go to a certain place with him.

Letter from Same dated 2<sup>d</sup> September 1881 requesting that a copy of the Estimate of the New Rates be furnished to them when approved by the Board of Guardians.

Letter from The Accountant Board of Works dated 2<sup>d</sup> September 1881 stating that the Board will accept for the present half the instalment (£1251.10.-) for the Seed loan and the second as soon as possible.

Circular from The Clerk, Gort Union dated 31<sup>st</sup> August 1881 transmitting Copy of resolutions of that Board relative to the advisability when taking Workhouse Contracts of preferring Irish Materials and Irish Manufactured articles &c.

The Board approved of same.

Letter from the Contractor for painting dated 2<sup>d</sup> September 1881 Complaining of the Master not having supplied him with certain materials to enable him to proceed with his Contract and other acts of the Masters, which prevented him from proceeding Satisfactorily with same.

Order. The Master should have supplied ochre when asked for by the Painter and until the Contract for painting be completed proper care must be taken that Paint stuffs will be supplied when required.

Having minutely investigated the Charges preferred by certain females inmates against the Contractor McCabe as appear from the Minutes of Evidence forwarded herewith to the Local Government Board and taken down by the Clerk and as it appears those parties had not complained of the Conduct of McCabe until the difference arose between him and the Schoolmistress the Board is now unwilling to attach credence to the Statements made by those inmates.

Upon application of the Medical Officer Shoes were ordered for an inmate named Owen Monaghan, a large burner for Hospital and a feeding Cup for use in fever Hospital.



The tender of Mr M. Keller was accepted at Seven pounds fifteen shillings for effecting repairs to the Caple Window on the female side of the House as recommended by Mr Hempster.

Dr. Raughan having drawn the Guardians attention to the Circular of the Local Government Board of the 6<sup>th</sup> August 1857 as regards the admision of Casuals or Night Lodgers to the Workhouse. the Master was directed to strictly Comply in future with the conditions referred to in the Circular as regards their clothing and treatment, as also that each of them should be Compelled to perform a certain task of work while in the House and that he report at each meeting in his Journal the number of this Class admitted during the Week, and how they had been treated, and if the required work had been performed by them, also, that proceedings be taken under the Pauper Act in all Cases that come within the scope of its provisions.

Letter from same dated 30<sup>th</sup> September 1881 stating as regards the area of charge for sinking the well at Newtown Dalry that it does not appear the Guardians at last meeting had under consideration the representations of the Local Government Board as to the proportion borne by the estimated cost of the works to the valuation of the townland of Kilmacraugh and enquiring if the plan and specification have been as yet received from Mr Kempster.

The Board duly considered this matter at last meeting and were of opinion that the townland of Kilmacraugh should be the area of charge. The specification has been received from Mr Kempster and will be forwarded to the Local Government Board.
