In reply to their letter of 27th inst No 2422/1882 The Board desire to state that they will take immediate steps to have this Burial ground enclosed.

Letter from Mr E Townsend C. E. dated 27th January 1882 requesting payment of the balance £ 140 due him for his professional services in connexion with the Loughrea Water Works.

The Clerk was directed to request Mr Townsend would furnish details of his claim for services rendered by him.

Letter from Mr John Donohoe dated 25th January 1882 stating as regards Mr Lamb's claim for Compensation in connexion with the Templemore Graveyard that both Mr Mitchell and he considered he would be fully paid in getting

£ 10 but that he did not take into consideration his claim for cutting up the Road as he sees no loss sustained to him in this matter.

Upon the report of S. S. O. Nevin a part of the wall around Sanybreeda Graveyard was ordered to be repaired and Mrs. Fallon to be cautioned against allowing her sheep to trespass therein in future.

Relieving Officer Reckham having drawn the Board's attention to the case of a Boy named John Conway in the Kilteshill Division who is in Fever and that the Father objects to send him to the Workhouse Hospital he was directed to take steps for the compulsory removal of this case to the Fever Hospital in accordance with Section 141 of the Public Health Act 78.

Messrs. Toole and Kennedy were named a Committee for ascertaining amounts to be paid for the domestic Water Rate in Loughrea and the Clerk was directed to forward samples of the water from the fountains and pipes to Dr. Cameron for analysis.

The question of the Athenry sewage works having been considered a letter was read from Major Lapdell and a protest signed by several of the rural Rate Payers against extending the Area of Taxation for these works. A Memorial from the Town Rate Payers praying that the entire burden of such a heavy Rate be not placed on them. A Report from Dr. Leonard upon the necessity of carrying out the Sewage works and a letter also read from Mr. Lambert requesting that he be paid the 30 years rent of the Field.

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A Deputation consisting of Messrs. O'Connor and Kelly as representing the Ratepayers of Athenry having attended before the Board and referred to the heavy taxation under which the Ratepayers of the townland of Athenry at present labour having Poor Rate of $\frac{2}{3}$ in the £ and Public Bess of $\frac{3}{4}$ urged most respectfully that no further taxation be imposed upon them for some time at least and that an additional apportionment of $\frac{1}{2}$ in the £ for the proposed Sewage work would be more than the already overtaxed Ratepayers of that Town could bear and besides it has been stated to the Board that the proposed system of Sewage would not be a success.

Mr. Gallagher proposed and Mr. Blake seconded that the proposed Sewage Scheme for Athenry be abandoned and that a proper system of Scavenging under the supervision of S. S. O. Glynn be substituted for same. Carried unanimously.

A Committee consisting of Messrs. Gallagher, Blake, O'Connor, R. Irvine, and J. M. Donagh was appointed with Dr. Leonard Medical Officer of Health to report to the Board as to the best manner in which the system of Scavenging could be carried out in the Town of Athenry.

Pursuant to Notice the Case of the inmate Mary Kelly having been inquired into her Chastity was altered from the Grange Electoral Division to the Union at large and the Register corrected accordingly.

The Proposal of Thomas Burke at £30 was accepted for the grazing of the Workhouse Farm up to the 1st March 1892 a stamped agreement to be entered into with him.

Athensy 1st March 1882

According to the wishes of the Board we met on the 26 February and made a minute examination of the Streets of Athensy which it was proposed to drain. We came to the Conclusion that any system of scavenging would be a useless expenditure of Money as it could not in any way remedy the evils complained of. We can have no hesitation in saying that the sewerage is absolutely required and to carry it out at the least expense we would suggest that a drain be constructed through Chapel Lane North Gate street connecting Whelans plot and through Court Lane into Mr O'Connor's field at the back of the Old Castle that a proper tank be constructed with provision for distributing the overflow evenly over a portion of the field, that Mr O'Connor be recompensed for the land required and be also allowed an annual sum for the clearing of the tank. We are of opinion that this if properly carried out is all the drainage that will ever be required in Athensy.
