Letter from the Treasurer dated 16<sup>th</sup> November 1882 intimating that the Directors of the National Bank have approved the Guardians overdrawing their Current Account to the amount of £500

His reasons for these suggestions are that if the legal diet was not interpreted with each patient would have at Dinner, one pint of good hot Soup (a great blessing in this weather) made by the meat stations added for the 16 very infirm patients being boiled in the general pot. The ration of each of these patients is only 2oz Cooked Meat in all about 15 lb Meat and bones. The bit of raw boiled Meat is of very little use but the Soup is most valuable and serves the patients, and which he calmly slowly and deliberately eats they would not think of refusing. It is easy to make poor timid people say what persons wish.
