Letter from The Local Government Board dated 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1882 drawing attention to the instalment of the Seed Loan (£1350) due by this Union on the 1<sup>st</sup> August last being still unpaid and stating that unless paid before the 1<sup>st</sup> February next they would consider the propriety of putting in force the powers given by the 3<sup>rd</sup> Section of The Seed Supply Act under which the Treasurer would be bound to pay over the sum in question to the Board of Works out of any money then in his hands or subsequently received by him for the Guardians.

Respecting the Local Govt Boards refusal to sanction the instalment of loan (£250) to meet present claims upon these Works Mr Townsend's claim of £140 for services as Superintendent, plans to be of the Works being included.

The Guardians of the Loughrea Electoral Division request the Local Government Board, will reconsider this matter and sanction the payment of the instalment sought. The Engineer Mr Townsend is pressing his claim, which should have been paid long since, and the original Estimate of the Rates made to meet the expenditure for the maintenance of the Works and other Works which were partly had to be carried out, not being sufficient - induces the Guardians to hope that the Local Government Board will be good enough to sanction the payment to their credit of the balance of the Loan viz £500 when they shall have a sufficient rate made to meet all claims upon them in future.

The Board therefore would request The Local Government Board to reconsider their decision with a view to complying with the resolution passed at last meeting.
