Letter from the Manager Beaver Line dated 17th April 1883 stating that their vessels would call at Galway for Emigrants provided the Board would guarantee not less than 100 adults for a sailing and that passengers would be landed at Quebec and sent by Rail to Boston or New York

The Board deeming the foregoing not in accordance with the arrangements entered into with their Agent Mr O'Brien he attended before the Board and promised to further communicate with the Manager thereon

The list of Emigrants Form B having been submitted and enquired into the Clerk was directed to vote thereon the case of 4 parties who are not chargeable to any of the Scheduled Divisions

The Board allowed a man named Pat Killeen a sum of £2 out of the Rates to aid his Emigration Expenses to America and a sum of £4 to another party named Joseph Kelly for a like purpose

Pursuant to Notice the case of the man Martin Walsh and family at present on Out Door Relief having been inquired into and it appearing that they are properly chargeable to the Union at large their chargeability was altered accordingly

Upon the application of the Medical Officer 25 leeches were ordered for Hospital use and the Clerk directed to issue advertisements for the annual supply of Mens and Womens Shoes to the Workhouse
