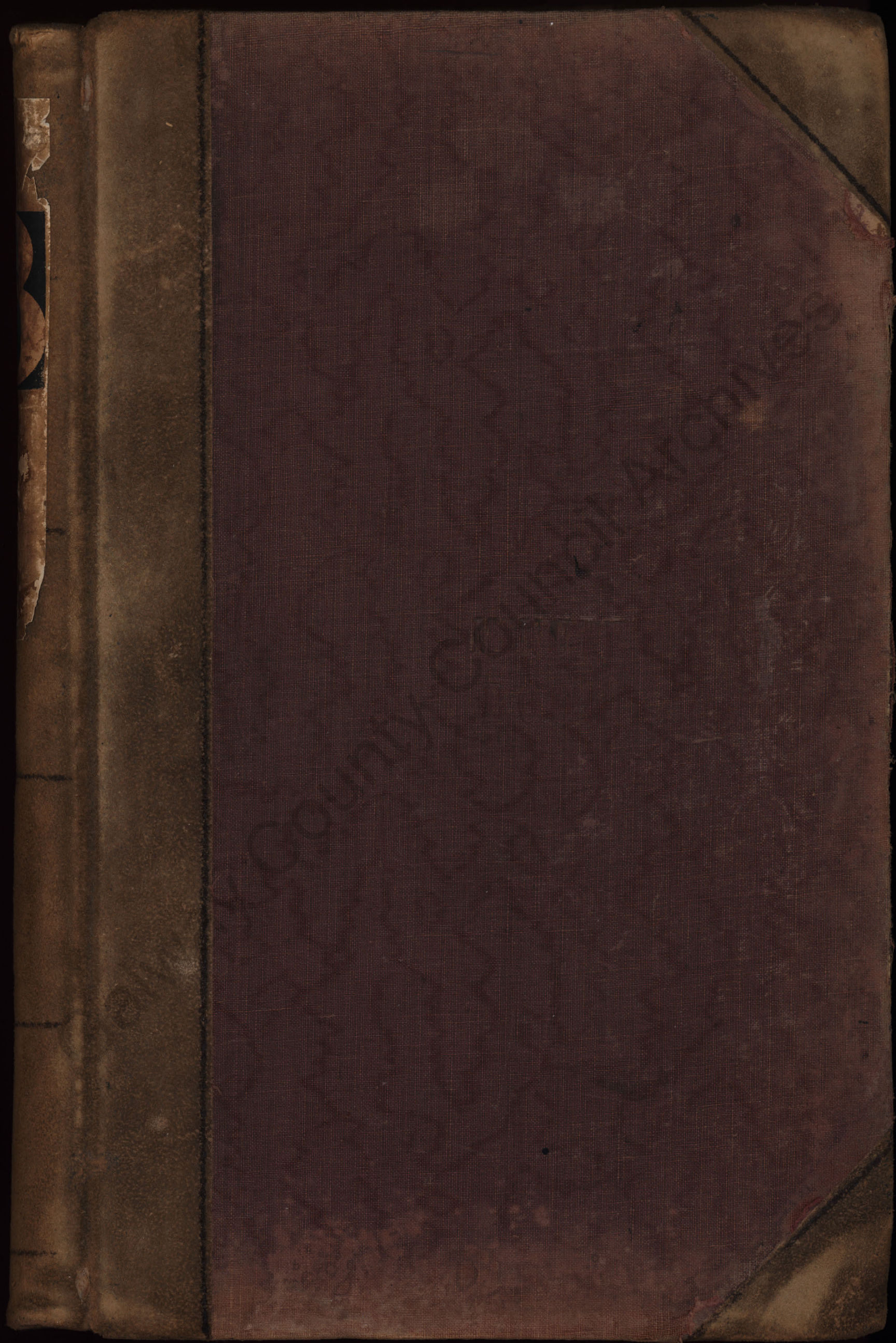

The state of the Collection is most unsatisfactory. The Collectors have now four Warrants of Rates in course of Collection in their hands and in the Account under Audit there were three Warrants in their hands and in many Electoral Divisions during the Half year under Audit nothing was lodged on account of the Rates for 1880-1881 and 1881-1882.

The accumulation of undlosed Accounts must result in confusion and probably in considerable loss. It is far preferable to carry a heavy arrear into a new Rate than to leave more than one Warrant and set of Books in hands of Collectors

The Guardians will find in closing poor rates at the same time that there will be a large irrecoverable arrear as unexpected as it will be unpleasant and this is now estimated as a good debt. I think the opinion of the Local Gov. Board should be asked whether the Collectors may not take Poor Rates now from parties against whom they have endeavoured but failed to get Decrees for Seed Rate. I believe there are many such cases which tend in a measure to prevent closing back collections.
