Report of Clothing Committee

132

November 29th 1882

Your Committee beg leave to report that they attended on the 13 October 1810 and subsequently on the 24th inst and took stock of the clothing in use and in store on those days.

In comparison with the Clothing Receipt Book, there appeared some few discrepancies in the Mens and Bap clothing, which might have occurred in counting over the numerous articles so separated and divided, so on the whole Your Committee ^{consider} the Stock as shown by the Books to be correct and in the House.

Having had the
severable articles separated from the worn out
and had, they recommend that the following be
condemned and struck off the Book as unfit for
bear or use by the inmates namely—

of whom have applied for articles for wear
and bedding purposes - but that a sufficient
number of the old Petticoats and Rugs
be retained for mopping cloths, as also a
few of the old Blankets

Your Committee having inspected
the Drying Room attached to the Laundry would
recommend that the present Apparatus be
condemned as worn out and useless - being there
for over 40 years, they are informed that when
heated this effects creasing the broken
chinks and cracks instead of drying the
clothes

They suggest that one stove
good and Portable be procured in their
stead, which the Matron states will
answer in place of the old System of dais
gone by, and that it will moreover effect
a saving in the weekly consumption of fuel

Your Committee also recommend
Shelving to be placed in one of the Hospital
Wards to which their attention has been
called by the Sisters in charge

matter requiring observation came under the
notice of your Committee and they here to
state that they were well pleased with the
order and cleanliness observable throughout
the House and Hospital, and that the
manner in which the Matron had her
stock of clothing arranged for inspection
and examination was most creditable to
her and facilitated your Committee in
their labours on the occasions in question
