The Board directed that a Special Meeting be summoned for the 17th Jan to consider this question.

Letter from same dated 2nd Jan 1883 referring to the charges preferred against Rel. Officer Glynn and stating that they are informed by their Inspector S. Woodhouse that the Rel. Officer admitted that he had withheld the relief from these poor people, and that he has continued to charge them without payments of the Amts charged by him to the Union and that he has moreover neglected

neglected his attendance at the Beaughwell Relief Station on the appointed day, being there only on one Wednesday during the last month; showing that under those circumstances they cannot concur in the views of his case taken by the majority of the Guardians assembled at last meeting, and they request that Mr. Glynn be at once called upon to resign his office of Relieving Officer for the Athlone District.

Mr. Glynn having been called before the Board and the foregoing letter read for him, he tendered his resignation of the office of Rel. Officer and San. Sub Officer which was accordingly accepted, and the Clerk directed to advertise for the appointment of his successor on the 17th Jan at a salary of £30 a year for both offices. Relieving Officer Connolly was appointed to the temporary charge of the Athlone Relief District in the mean time at the same rate of salary as allowed Mr. Glynn.
