He got no intimation of the Board having fixed a diet if it did he much wronged the Helpers by depriving them of their accustomed Butter and Porter which they received in addition up to and for some time after his appointment. The Board ordered 3½ lbs meat weekly for Rosa Joyce in the interest of the sick poor and to prevent discontent he recommended the same quantity for the Hospital Helpers hence the Meat alluded to is merely an equality. Those who discharge menial and often revolting offices for patients with infectious and disgusting diseases deserve a little extra kindness of which there is a very strong instance at present in the Fever Hospital
