A contract having been already entered for this purpose with two local papers No order was made on the foregoing

Believing Officer Beirne reported

With reference to the case of Margaret Haice and three children at present in the House. I beg to state that immediately before they entered the house they lived in Loughrea for two years and four months and for over five years before that in Dugurane in the Electoral Division of Kilmuckree

In reference to the above the Board wish to be informed whether under Sec. 3 of the Poor Law Rating Act of 1876 the chargeability should be a Union or a Divisional charge

Upon the application of a man named James Callanan whose passage has been paid to America the Board allowed him subject to the approval of The Local Gov. Board a suit of The Emigrants Clothing in Store and a sum of 10<sup>s</sup> to defray his travelling charges

The tender of Mr. John Bunniffe was accepted for the years supply to the Workhouse of Fresh Butter at 1<sup>s</sup> per lb and Eggs at 1<sup>s</sup> per score and as regards the Coal directed that a supply of 5 tons be procured from Mr. Hatley Kinwarra and to make further inquiries as to present prices

The Clerk laid before the Board the several Bonds and other securities at present in force and in his custody and reported that Mr. A. Derwan one of the Sureties named in the Bond of Welb. Officer Salor is now a Guardian

The Board directed that Mr. Salor be called on to submit the name of another Surety and also that Welb. Officer Kelly submit the name of a Surety in place of Mr. Samuel Smyth and Mr. James M. Carthy (Contractor) one in place of Mr. Michael Kennedy
