A Draft for the Sum of £164:9:8 (the Parliamentary grant for Medical and educational Expenditure) received from the Local Govt Board was ordered to be lodged with the Treasurer to the credit of the Union.

The Board desire to refer for the opinion of the Local Government Board 2 Bills furnished for Bed clothes to be supplied for use of the Sisters of Mercy upon taking charge of the Hospital as Nurses. The articles referred to were procured by the Nuns upon the recommendation of a Committee of the Board, but not procured in the regular manner by Contract and a demand has now been made for payment. The Board have no doubt but that the clothing in question was supplied on the occasion to the Nuns acting as Hospital Nurses as certified to by them.

The Board desire to draw the attention of the Medical Officer and Sisters in charge to the large increase in the consumption of fuel which has taken place in the Hospital as compared with the returns of preceding years, and to urge upon them the advisability of economizing as much as possible in this particular so as to reduce the expenditure in the cost of fuel which has lately become so excessive.
