42787/86 Letter from Same dated 14<sup>th</sup> October 1886 enclosing copy of a communication addressed by the Insurer relative to the non payment of the sum of £79:9:4, applied upon this Union under the provisions of the Contagious Diseases (Animals, Act.

It appears on referring to the Bank Book that this sum was on the 27<sup>th</sup> ult. paid into the Bank of Ireland by the Treasurer.

Letter from the Rev. John W.
