26961/87 Letter from the Local Government Board dated 23 June 1887 transmitting a form of particulars to be filled up respecting the Case of Murphy whom the Board proposed to admit to emigrate. On reconsideration the Board consider this is not a fit case to assist out of the rates.

26960/87 Letter from same dated 24 June 1887 stating as regards the defalcations of the late Rel. Officer Kelly that the Bond under which he and his Sureties are bound is conditioned for the due and faithful performance of the duties of the office, but they consider that the Guardians should be guided by legal advice in any proceedings against the Sureties arising out of the alleged default of the late Relieving Officer in the withholding of the out door Relief from certain poor people in his District.

The Guardians have to inform the Sureties of the late Rel. Officer Kelly that as far as can be ascertained a sum of about £26 is due by him to the several poor persons in his District and wish to give them an opportunity of making good such sum before proceeding on his Bond.

The Clerk was directed to send to the Guardians a list of the parties in the Athenry District on Out Door Relief with the amount due each of them as acknowledged by the late Relieving Officer and request he would test its accuracy.

Letter from the Treasurer dated 2 July 1887 requesting cheques for the amount assessed upon this Union under the Contagious Diseases Animals Act and for the half years Interest due upon the Building Loan.
