The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect or (Orders made on them respectively as follow).—

Letter from M. R. Moran L. Trickett dated 23<sup>rd</sup> Nov-1887 stating that Donshoe (the man referred to in the Master's Report read at last meeting) is desirous of getting his elder son Thomas, aged 10 years out of the Workhouse to live with him as he has no person at present to look after his place and that he (R.M.) believes that both father and son would require an allowance of Out door Relief.

The Board having consulted R.O. Lalor thereon considered it better that this boy should remain in the Workhouse.

Petition from an inmate named Catherine Galvin dated 26<sup>th</sup> Nov-1887 praying that the Board would be pleased to take some steps to compel her Husband, Pat. to maintain her

her outside and not leave her any longer a burden on the Rates of the Union.

Ordered, That the Rel<sup>d</sup> Officer call on P. Galvin to take out his wife and support her or come into the House himself.

Letter from Collector, Congrave dated 26<sup>th</sup> Nov-1887 stating that having been disappointed in getting a few large sums from certain parties owing Rates and as he has made some seizures he requests the Board would allow him till next week to realize the proceeds of the Auction and finally close his account.

Collector Flanagan appeared before the Board and requested a further extension of time to close his Collection until after the Fair of Loughrea on the 5<sup>th</sup> prox. when several Defaulters promised to then pay him their Rates.

This subject having been fully considered the Board agreed to extend the time for finally closing to all the Collectors and fixed on the 6<sup>th</sup> Dec prox. for doing so and that no further Concessions would be afterwards allowed them and directed the Clerk to apprise the Collectors and their Sureties accordingly.

The R. C. Chaplain having attended before the Board explained the necessity of providing the Vestments for Divine Service as applied for on the 12<sup>th</sup> inst. he produced the two suits selected by him, the price being £15. 5. 0. The Board approved the selection made by Father Cunningham and directed that they be given in charge to the Sisters acting as Nurses in Hospital.
