Letter from the Registrar General dated 4th July 1888 stating in reference to the resolution adopted at last meeting that the Memorandum accompanying it as regards the letters is issued from his office on the occasion of the appointment of Mr. John Fude appears to be correct that when certain information required in his case had been furnished his name was then submitted to the Lord Lieutenant who was pleased to appoint him to the position, adding in reply to the last paragraph in the resolution that he has not referred the Guardians to his letter of the 26th Ult^o on the subject.

The Board must express their very great surprise at the assertion in the foregoing letter that the appointment of Registrar for the Quinlan District had been made by the Lord Lieutenant and not by the Board of Guardians.

His letter of the 15th & 29th January 88 distinctly refers to the appointment as made by the Board on the 10th January previous and it appears so plain & unambiguous that the Registrar General did not at the time inform the Guardians of the Executive and not they had appointed Mr. Fude but admitting such to be the case why was not a like course adopted on the late occasion. Mr. Lacey was appointed at a large meeting of the Board his qualifications for the office being deemed sufficient and character unquestionable and to pass over and ignore the claims of the Candidate chosen (on what grounds it is not stated) is to say the least most disrespectful to this Board - the Representatives of the Rate payers who alone bear the burden of the expenses connected with this office.

In referring to the letter of the 26th Ult^o the Board do not see any reason given - merely the statement that the Board neglected to make the appointment within 14 days after the Office had been declared vacant, and they must again ask the Registrar General to give an explicit reply to this question.
