My inmate named Denis Burns charged on the Punishment Book with— "Calling Mary Burke improper names, throwing boiling Soap and a Stone at her and attempting to strike her with a Spoon" was called before the Board and cautioned that on a repetition of such Conduct in the Workhouse, he would be summoned before the Magistrates. A complaint in writing had been previously made to the Board by the Woman Mary Burke. During the inquiry into the foregoing matter, it appeared that at the time of the quarrel between those parties the Master had been absent at his own House taking Breakfast as he stated. The Board expressed their disapproval of this arrangement and then decided opinion, that the Master like other inside Officers— should take his meals in the Workhouse, and not at his private residence outside, as his practice has been.

The Medical Officer's Report. That occasionally the quantity of bone included in the Patients' meat is unreasonable. on last Thursday in about 14 lb meat there were 4 lb Bones.

With reference to the foregoing. The Master states that the quantity of Bone on the occasion referred to was not more than ordinary supplies to Hospital.

The consideration of the question of increased Cost and quantities of Staples being consumed in House and Hospital was further postponed to next meeting.

The Sisters in charge asked to have 23 Men's old Shirts and 6 Shirts (last as being) urgently required for Pauper's Cloths, and your Committee having seen the Articles, recommended that they be rejected accordingly. They drew attention to the Requisition furnished by them on the 26th January 1888, and which yet appeal the Medical Officer declined to recommend, and having inspected the Stock of Sins to at present in use your Committee suggests to refer the matter back to the Medical Officer with the view of entering them on his Weekly Return.

The Bell at the Entrance Door of the Hospital requires to be repaired and adjusted by a Bell Hanger."

Your Committee having inspected the leakage in the Wall of the Hospital Ward - referred to in the Master's Report - recommend that when the Weather permits the external portions and joints of the Wall that are defective should be well raked out and properly cemented by a competent tradesman"

A new Iron Gate - similar to the one at the entrance to the Farm - ought be provided to replace the old Wooden Gate - at present useless - at the passage to the rear of the Hospital, and the Roads around the House require to be gravelled"
