Your Committee drew the Master's attention to this matter and impressed on him the advisability of being more particular in future in seeing that the correct allowance is entered not alone in this but every other department of the Establishment and that above but correct returns should be submitted to the Board at each meeting.

The Medicine-Presses in the Wards would require to be firmly secured to the Walls by Hoed fasts and three small Tables to be placed in each Ward for the convenience of the very weak patients and upon which their Medicine or Stimulants could be laid near to hand and available when required for using.

The lathing and plastering over the fire place in the male Ward as recommended by your Committee in their last report have been carried out and the appearance of the Ward is considerably improved thereby. They would recommend that two pictures suitable for a Sick Ward be provided and hung on either side of this fire place. The large Kettle requiring to be repaired, this has been done and your Committee approved thereof.
