Your Committee beg to report that since last meeting of your Board they attended at Enniscorthy accompanied by the Contractor and took into consideration the question of the Boundary Fence to be erected between the Plots attached to the Cottages and the other portion of the Mess^{rs} McCarthy's Field. They are of opinion that a Stone Wall to run from the old Galloway Road to the Gut Road which would be in or about 18ⁱⁿ high Perches would form the best sort of a division. The Wall to be 4ⁱⁿ feet high and to be 2 feet wide for 18 inches from the foundation and the remaining 3 feet single. The Wall to be well and substantially built and finished same as the best description of similar Stone Walls in the District.

As regards Cost thereof your Committee having gone into calculations consider £30 would be the nearest Estimate, and they are of opinion that

that one half this amount should be borne by the Guardians and the other half by the Contractor and they recommend your Committee to agree to these terms, the Contractor having signified his willingness to abide by their, the Committee's decision in this respect.

Your Committee urged on the Contractor to have the Cottages, Offices &c. completed as soon as possible, as the time for doing so has long since expired.

The Chairman reported.

After the adjournment of the Board on Saturday last, a man named Denis Burns who had been that day admitted to the Workhouse complained that his allowance of Bread for the Dinner meal was deficient in weight. Having got the Master to weigh the Bread, I found (assuming that the Weights were correct) that it was not deficient. It however occurring to me that the Weights were not correct. I tested them as well as I could and found that some of the Weights in use were deficient; namely the 4 lb Weight by $\frac{1}{4}$ lb and also a 2 lb Weight, the deficiency in which I was unable to ascertain, and I would recommend that all the Weights in the House be regularly tested and adjusted. Having weighed a large number of loaves of Bread purporting to be 4 lb in weight each I found that they did not stand the weight.

I

I would suggest that in future the Master shall carefully weigh all Bread and other Provisions as well as Meesparies received from the Contractors and give credit for no more than the quantity actually supplied.

When next the Contract for Bread Stuff shall be before the Board I would suggest that Baker's Brown Bread be substituted for the Brown Bread at present used; the quantity consumed being small there is an undue proportion of Coal consumed in the baking thereof, and moreover the Bread appears to me to be very badly baked and must therefore be very unwholesome.
