The following Report was read 19th October 1889

Your Committee beg to report that in accordance with your request they attended at the Workhouse on Thursday last to examine into the damages caused to the Establishment by the Storm on the Night of the 6th Inst. They are glad to report that notwithstanding its severity comparatively speaking little harm has been done. There are some bare spots and slates displaced on the Roof of the main Building Chapel &c and it would be necessary to further employ a Slater and have these repaired, as also hang a lattice in the Roof where the Bell is fixed, and the floor which is partly rotted under-neath by the rain flowing in repaired and the Window in the Clothing Store glazed. The

Gate at the entrance to the Shed where the Dams are placed and which was blown down by the Storm can be taken away, as it is not required there, and it could be hereafter put to some other use. The Dam intended for the conveyance of infectious Cases to Hospital should be examined by a competent tradesman, and if any repairs are required to have it put in working order and also painted. One of the

Hospital Windows blown in some time ago and broken should be repaired, and defective portions of the Hospital and Chapel Chimneys cemented. The Grates previously ordered by your Board for the Hospital Chimneys have not been as yet supplied and they suggest that this matter should be at once called to

As regards the Glass broken throughout the House and Hospital they recommend that the Master be called on to submit a return

Return showing the number of panes broken in
 each Department and Cause. Whereof The Sisters
 in charge drew their attention to a leakage in the
