Letter from The Local Government Board dated 14 March 1890 referring to the report of Sir C. Cameron upon the quality of the Milk sent him for analysis (from which it appeared that same had been adulterated with 50.40. and 12.40 Cent of Water respectively) and to the order of the Board thereon, stating that having regard to the facts disclosed by Sir C. Cameron they consider the Guardians should prosecute those three Milk Contractors Ridge, Flynn and Finnerty.

With reference to the foregoing letter from The Local Government Board the Board of Guardians wish to inform them that having regard to the fact that up to date no complaints had been made of the quality of the Milk supplied by the Contractors and the explanations offered by them the

the Board decided upon not opening a prosecution on this occasion, and have cautioned them that should the Milk supplied in future be of inferior quality they shall not escape prosecution. Two of the Contractors Ridge and Finnerty, being in attendance were called before the Board and their attention drawn to the foregoing letter from The Local Government Board and they were warned as to the consequences should they give cause for such complaints in future. At the request of the latter the Master was directed to proceed to the Contractor's residence and to have one of the Cows milked in his presence, and to obtain a sample of the Milk and forward it to Sir C. A. Cameron for analysis.
