## Report of Visiting Committee

10<sup>th</sup> April 1890

Your Committee met at the Workhouse this  
day and took into consideration the several  
matters referred to in the recent report of the  
Local Government Board's Inspector.

As regards the  
internal painting recommended by him your  
Committee consider that this could be postponed  
for another year at least, and that provision be  
made in the next Estimate for the expense  
thereof, which will be a rather heavy item.

In the  
matter of the clothing materials your Committee  
understand that the Tailor is at present  
employed making up men's & boys' clothing suits,  
but as there is no female inmate now in the House  
competent to assist the Mahon to make the  
clothing for the women or girls your Committee  
recommend that she be authorized to secure  
the services of an Assistant from the outside  
for one month.

A



A Slater should be employed to repair and staunch the leakages in the Roof referred to, and it appears the Plumber is at present repairing the Pipes and Cocks which were out of order. In the Cooking Kitchen your Committee recommend that one of the Boilers at present in use be taken down and properly re-set, and a new front and door provided for it, by which it is expected that a considerable saving will be effected in the consumption of Fuel; the flagging in the Scullery adjoining should be repaired and the casing of one of the pipes partially covered with zinc or tin to prevent the possibility of vermin getting into the Cistern Laundry. An iron Sheet or Gutter with drop piece supported by Brick piers to be placed under the Wash Trough would be very necessary, and your Committee recommend to have same supplied.

Women's Yard - A Paver to be employed to pave the passage leading from the Dining Hall to the Hospital

Chapel

Chapel - A Stand or Wooden frame to be provided for the Holy Water Font and a passage effected from the body of the Chapel into the left of the Sanctuary by cutting an open in the Altar rails; the Sisters say it will partly save the Carpet and flooring inside to have this done.

Hospital Laundry - A new Washing Trough is required here as well as a stand for the bottles; the brick work of the Boiler to be repaired and a new Lid provided for it; the flooring to the left which appears wet and damp should be flagged with Mel-bay flags - Similar to the space to the right under the Trough; the outside Sewer conveying the Waste Water requires to be cleaned out and paved, and the two Tables in the Laundry to be also repaired and a new Lead-pipe to convey the Water to the troughs is required - the Cocks are still serviceable.

The external passage from the Laundry to the Hospital should be paved as in Wet Weather, the gravel causes the flooring of the Wards to get filthy, which the paving will prevent.

Your Committee have no other suggestions to make at present only to state that the Wards and apartments in the House and Hospital visited by them on the occasion were clean and orderly.

I beg to report that I had to attend, as Witness in the trial of "The Guardians & French" which took place in the Court of Queen's Bench on Thursday last before Judge Gibson and a Common Jury, where a Verdict was given for the Defendant on two grounds, namely, 1st, that the land "inhabited" was not situated in the Manor before the words "Dwelling House" and, 2nd (and more important), that the Defendant being resident in Rathmore, and within the jurisdiction, the action should have been brought before the Recorder, and not into the Superior Courts. Were it not for these pleas on the part of the Defendant I could easily gauge from the evidence of your Witness, and the observation of the learned Judge who tried the case, that there was a clear violation of Sec 2 of the Evicted Tenants Protection Act and that the result should have been in your favour. Your learned Counsel raised some legal points for future argument of which your Solicitor will doubtless inform you. I was unable to check the Master's Bills for the past week but will do so early next week.
