Board's Minute 26th April 1890

In explanation I beg to say that the infectious disease Whooping Cough being epidemic in the school I found it necessary to remove some of the Children to the Hospital for infectious disease in the mean time a man suffering from deadly Typhus Fever was being sent into hospital I could not think of exposing the poor Children to the contagion, and directed the Master to take them back to the school when that form of infection already existed, the only course open to me; accommodation for infectious disease being very circumscribed, Being ill of course I could not remove their names off the hospital books.

If any of the Children were unfit for removal back to the school the case would have been very seriously complicated On the occasion of a residence being prepared for the Nuns I advocated that the hospital be left intact for the purpose of meeting emergencies such as

the present. I now recommend that the spare wards on the ground floor, at each wing of the hospital be put in a condition fit to receive infectious disease when necessary
