The Board having taken into consideration a statement made by Mary Burke an inmate regarding the case of the child Richard aged 17 months that the Medical officer had declined to take the child into Hospital or to afford it the Medical treatment that it required and having seen the child and also heard the explanation of the Medical officer as to his reason for not having treated

treated this child in Hospital when his attention was first called to it are of opinion that from the dreadfully emaciated condition of this child it required the greatest care and they now have to express their decided opinion that this child should have been taken into Hospital by the Medical officer and they have further to state that a grave responsibility shall rest on him should he any longer defer taking this child into Hospital and affording it the care, attention and nourishment which can be given therein

The Board accepted the tender of Mr. John Cunneiffe for the supply to the Workhouse for one year from this date of Fresh Butter at 1-0 1/2 lb. and Eggs at 11.3 1/2 score, and directed the Clerk to refuse advertisements for the supply of Rochester to the Workhouse and several Relief Districts - tenders to be received on the 24th prox. and also on the same day for 130 tons Breasted House Coals - to be delivered at the Workhouse within two months from the date of the acceptance of the tender.

The Abstract of the Valuation List relating to this Union, as revised and amended for the present year having been laid before the Board the Clerk was directed to publish the usual notice of their being open for inspection.

The Medical Officer Report. Having inspected the Workhouse Cemetery on the 27th inst he found the recently made graves much too close both at the sides and at the ends, and he recommends that more space be assigned to the graves, and the graves more carefully finished off, that the Cemetery generally be better cared, the long grass cut, and a walk made across the Cemetery.

The Board approves of the Medical Officer's recommendation, who is requested to state what space between the graves he considers sufficient.

By the Bank Book it appeared that the Veterinary Department has lodged the sum of £3.2.6 with the Treasurer to the credit of the Union, being one half the expenses under the Contagious Diseases Animals Act for the month of January last.

As an inmate Mary Burke never asked to have her child sent to hospital but on the 28th ultimo I attended in Bigotts Lane Richard Burke on a Dispensary Visiting Ticket then his Mother asked me to send him to Hospital which I looked on as a stratagem for her and family to return to the Workhouse a difficulty to do so existing because I understood little over a week previously she got two pounds of the rates.

The Nursery is the fit place for this child and the Mother the proper person to care him his emaciation is due to malnutrition the consequence of weakness of the digestive organs. A mixed rice and milk diet is the most suitable for him I have given written instructions for his management. He has not been neglected for nearly five months he has been almost daily on extras. Although the Board's Minute is strong still the results showing the brilliant success attending my treatment.

Anne Loppinger from the nursery I have fixed
a milk diet for her and pointed out the
necessity for an attendant to care her It
is only in the case of skin affections injuries
