COPY of MINUTES of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians, at a Meeting held on Saturday the 6th day of September 1890

PRESENT: In the Chair, Colonel Daly
Other Guardians: Major Rogers & Mr. W. Robinson

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 2077 to No. 2102 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Outdoor Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 1 to No. 10 inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of the Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:—

That Rel^y Officers Philson and Connelly have lodged with the Treasurer to the credit of the Union the sums of 3/0 & 7/6 respectively being the Out door Relief charged by them in their accounts but not apud to the late Bridget Hynes of Ballywinna. Collector Kennedy failed to attend for the examination of his accounts for the past fortnight. Collector Doughlin promises to attend on Friday next, and Collector Cagranse is away in Lisdoonbarra, but in his case only a sum of £69 remains uncollected out of £480 apud in his District.

Order If Collector Kennedy does not attend before Thursday next he will be suspended.

I sent repeated messages to Messrs Kennedy and P. Kennedy to attend and perfect their Bonds for the Supply of Sweet Milk to the Workhouse, but up to this they have failed to do so.

We the undersigned Executive Members of your Committee inspected the Hospital after the Board's Meeting of Saturday last and having the advantage of Mr. Reper's presence discussed the question of adopting means for supplying Hot Water to the Washing troughs, for the Laundry. Having heard the statement of the Sister in Charge and finding that it would be rather expensive to alter the Boilers for this purpose, the matter of providing a Turpido Washing Machine was brought under our notice, and a diagram thereof having been produced by the Clerk we decided to inspect one of those machines at present in use in the Laundry attached to the farmlet at Treacy in Longueva.

The Matron stated that a similar Machine is urgently required for her Laundry, as in consequence of the few able bodied females at present in that House she finds it most difficult to keep up a regular supply of Clean Linen and Clothing for the inmates under her charge.

We recommend your Board to call upon the Contractor Mr. P. Scrimgeour to complete the Contract entered into with him last April, for sundry repairs in House and Hospital and to have the Tables in the Hospital Laundry repaired without delay.

The Sister in Charge requested of us a Lawn-mower for use in the grounds attached to the Hospital, and seeing one at work at the time when it appears had been lent from the outside, and the improvement effected thereby we promised to recommend her application to the favourable consideration of your Board.
