In reference to the Fever Hospital I beg to say, that I am incompetent to report what repairs are necessary. It would require a tradesman to ascertain and estimate them.

All the Windows Grates Doors the wooden lining of the roof and bolts holding the parts together seem out of order or loose; the most glaring part is the glass portion of the roof which being broken admits floods of rain and wind.

Ordered the Master to employ a tradesman to repair the glass portion of the roof. The Doctor to again call the attention of the Guardians to the matter when the Hospital is unoccupied. The Board regret the Doctor did not report the state of the Hospital at an earlier period.
