The Board having heard Mr Kelly's explanation thereon beg to inform Mr M Hyer, that on a full review of the case, they are of opinion, that the Sewage Works referred to having been constructed by the advice and on the report of the Medical Officer of Health the expenditure was thereupon incurred, and the cost thereof paid out of the Rates; they therefore have no alternative, but to require that the sum referred to namely £29.8 be refunded by her in order to avoid further trouble and expense.

The Medical Officer's Report "that bringing the bodies of persons who die of infectious diseases to the Dead House is dangerous to the Establishment".

Order Inquire what does the Medical Officer suggest. That having received extract of resolution of the 22nd Ult. in which a "severe censure is implied"; the Board on perusal of Article 68 (Waltham Rules) where his duties are defined will recognize how unjustly as he literally carries out each instruction. Articles 64 & 65 (29 & 11) provide for the government discipline. Repairs, nursing to of the Waltham which term covers all departments. In a great national system of administration like that of the Post Office, there can be no varying interpretation. Clear rules being laid down for the guidance of each officer.

In

In the case of the Hospital for infectious diseases no more responsibility in any sense can be accepted such rests on him than he has in the other Hospital - to him both are alike.

With reference to the foregoing. The Board directed that the attention of the Medical Officer be drawn to Article 68, (par 5) of the Workhouse Rules - as they do not coincide in his views.

The unsatisfactory state of the poor Hospital should have been brought under their notice, at a time when the defects pointed out by him could have been remedied.
