Sanitary Sub Officer Kelly
got an increase of £5 in his salary in October
last sanctioned by a letter of the Local

paid the Amount thus paid but the
approval of the Treasury has not been notified
to the Guardians

The Collection of the Arrears
of late Collector Kennedy by the new Collector
Mr Hade has been very unsatisfactory but
through no fault of his. It appears that in
every Division of the District Receipts for
Rates are held for various Amounts
returned by Kennedy as uncollected arrears;
the mode in which this system of fraud
was

was done, is impossible of detection by the Clerk.
Receipts being given to holders of more than one
holding a number in the Warrant for full
Amount of all the numbers while the block
presented for checking to the Clerk for one
number of a small Amount. I suggested
at another Union, that at the close of each
Collection the Arrear Sheets sent in with
names and Amounts should be printed and
circulated so that Rate payers who were
wronged might come forward; at present
the names of persons in arrears are not known
beyond the Board Room; this plan has had
a good effect in the Union I allude to.

36454/91 Letter from the Local Government Board dated 26th August 1891 referring to the proposed emigration of the Woman Della Fitzgerald and her five children to Boston, and observing that it does not appear from the letter of encouragement that the Husband can be looked to to support his wife and children and that only two children have been recommended to emigrate, and that this Woman is at present receiving Out-door Relief and would be likely to become a burden on public Charities in America, they are not prepared to consent to any expenditure from the Rates in her case.

Circular from the Secretary Royal Commission on Labour dated 22nd August 1891 requesting to be furnished with certain information regarding Rates of payment and of work and the number employed in this Department.

The Returns (Form C, of Loans received and seed Potatoes distributed in the respective Electoral Divisions having been laid before the Board, were signed by the Chairman and agreed to be forwarded to the Local Government Board.

The Consideration of the Claims of the Officers employed in the distribution for remuneration for their services was postponed to next meeting. The Clerk was directed to have Hand-bills printed and posted throughout the Union reminding Purchasers of the seed Potatoes of the advantage of faithfully paying the Cost thereof and thus abating themselves of the reduction of 20cp Cent.

With reference to the Case of a man named Thomas Conry, referred to in minutes of the 8th inst who had been decreed by the Justices presiding at Woodford Petty Session on the 27th ult for Rates and Arrears due upon a tenement in the Electoral Division of Woodford. This man appeared before the Board to day (and having represented the hardship of being obliged to pay Rates and Arrears for the previous Occupier thereof, as he only came into possession in October '88. The Board direct the Clerk to transmit the Local Government Board particulars thereof, and request their opinion whether

whether the Collector would be justified in enforcing the Decree obtained at the Petty Sessions as it would appear that the Justices on the occasion had overlooked the limitation for proceeding for recovery of Rates and Sums as referred to in Section 119 of the Act 12 & 13 Vic Cap 104

The Clerk was directed to prepare the Annual Estimate of Rates and submit same for adoption at the Meeting of the 19th September. A printed Copy thereof to be previously supplied to each Guardian.

Upon the application of the Schoolmaster a Supply of Books and Requisites - Cost £1.19.5 - was ordered for the Workhouse School.

The Ruling of the Relieving Officers' Books - excepting a few Cases of urgency - was postponed to Next Meeting.
