Letter from same dated 25 August 1891 transmitting the minutes of evidence taken at the inquiry held by B. Clements on the 28th ult. into the condition of the Kellinier Daily Burial Ground stating that as it appears that the Burial Ground is attached to a place of worship and situate in a private Demesne, and as the Guardians are thereby precluded from taking action in the matter, they recommend that a strong representation be made to the Rev. J. Cahagan as to the necessity which exists for enclosing and securely fencing against trespass by animals this Burial Ground; also drawing attention to the overcrowded state of the Grave Yards of Kellulla, Mhenry and Clonmuckheril (as appears by the evidence), and to the necessity of the Burial Board taking steps thereon under Sec. 172 of the Public Health Act, and that they will lose no time in communicating to the Local Government Board an expression of their views and full information respecting the steps they may take in this important matter.

without thus giving them an opportunity of making a reasonable offer of settlement, but to this none of them have replied, and as it appears there is no likelihood of those parties coming to a settlement, he considers the best course to adopt would be to register the judgment as a mortgage against the interest of the Defendants' Holdings, and which they could not thereafter dispose of, without paying off the amount of the judgment mortgages.

The consideration of the foregoing was postponed to next meeting. The Clerk to ascertain from Mr. Mulcair the expense of registering the judgment as a mortgage against those parties.

The Clerk laid before the Board a Draft for the sum of £188.0.2/- being the amount of the Parliamentary Grant for the medical and educational expenditure for the past half year and he was directed to have same lodged with Treasurer to the Audit of the Union.

The Board having taken into consideration the claims of the officers engaged in the distribution of the seed potatoes under the Seed Potatoes Supply, Ireland, Act, agreed to the payment to the Clerk of £47.10.0 to the Master £25 to the Station £10 to the Gate and Rate Collectors £5 each and Relieving Officers Mulcair and Connolly £1 each. The Relieving Officer also received instructions as regards the removal of some of the patients who it was stated are now willing to come into Hospital.
