In this same District a large amount of Rate is returned as the defalcation of a late Collector (Hepion), and I think it would be well to write this off, as I believe the Guardians have done all in their power to recover upon Hepion's Surplus without effect. There are several Balances of the old Poor Rate of 1880 remaining on the Abstracts which are practically inoperable, and should be cleared off to avoid complication with the new Rate for the Loan under the Act of 1890. This should not apply to the Balance of Rates uncollected standing against the Account of late Collector Hepion, who should again be asked to come in for one hour to the Clerk to settle his Accounts.

There is nothing due by him on the Settlement, in fact, I believe the Balance is in his favour, but his attendance is necessary for a Settlement.

In regard to Put Down Relief payments <sup>made</sup> in Bylinagar Electoral Division, which were the subject of my observations at audit in December 1890 when Mr Lewis made his objections to them, but ruling on which I had to postpone for attendance of Relieving Officer. I am now unable to make any ruling owing to the continued absence, thro ill health of the Relieving Officer who distributed the relief and the length of time that has elapsed.
