The Company will not be accountable for correct delivery of Goods or Empties unless the name of Sender or Consignee is distinctly marked on each Package; nor will the Company be answerable for the loss or detention of or damage to Wrappers or Packages of any description, declared by Sender, and charged for by the Company as "Empties."

All Empties must be prepaid except Brewers' Empties.

The MIDLAND GREAT WESTERN RAILWAY OF IRELAND COMPANY hereby give notice of the following Conditions on which they receive traffic for conveyance. No Servant of the Company has authority to add to or vary the terms of these Conditions.

TRAFFIC RULES AND CONDITIONS.

1. ALL consignments are received subject to the rights of the Company, under 1 Wm. IV., chap. 58, and other statutes, and in addition to same the Company will not be liable for loss of, or injury to any goods described in the first section of said statute, which shall exceed Ten Pounds in value, unless at the time of delivery thereof for the purpose of being carried or of accompanying the person of a passenger, the value and nature of such goods shall have been declared to the Company by the person sending or delivering same, and such reasonable charge as compensation for the increased risk in the carriage thereof, as the Company shall in such case require, or an engagement to pay the same shall have been accepted by the Company.

2. The Company will not be liable in respect of goods delivered to them insufficiently packed, or secured, or directed, or described, when the loss, injury, or delay, shall be caused wholly or in part by such insufficient packing or sending, directing or describing; nor for leakage arising from insufficient casks or cooperage or from fermentation; and in case of goods, brittle, damageable or perishable, or which from their nature or mode of packing, require any special care or expedition in the sending, caring, or carriage of same, the Company will not be liable for any loss, injury, or delay attributable to the special nature, quality, or mode of packing of such goods, unless same shall have been properly described to the Company at the time of delivery, and such reasonable increased charge as the Company may require, or an engagement to pay same, shall have been given to the Company; nor will the Company be liable for the consequences of leakage or breakage of goods to other goods packed therewith, unless the existence of such first mentioned goods in the consignment shall have been declared to the Company in manner aforesaid, and such reasonable charge or engagement as aforesaid shall have been given.

3. Except on special conditions, signed by an agent of the Company, thereto authorised, the Company do not receive or carry Petroleum, Gunpowder, Lucifer Matches, Aquafortis, Vitriol, or other dangerous articles mentioned in the Railways' Clauses Consolidated Act, 1945, sec. 106; and the Petroleum Amendment Act, 1868; in the absence of such conditions persons sending or delivering same will be accountable for any injury thereto or arising therefrom, and if sent without the marks or written notice required by the statute are liable to a penalty of Twenty Pounds. The goods mentioned in the Petroleum Amendment Act, 1868, are only received when in casks or iron drums legibly marked according to clause 3 of that Act, viz: "Great care must be taken in bringing any light near to the contents of this vessel, as they give off inflammable vapour at a temperature of less than 100 degrees of Fahr. Thermometer."

4. In case of all animals, and goods for which a contract note with two rates of carriage shall be offered to the customer, the Company give him the alternative of adopting either rate; [at the full rate, which will be charged when the contrary is not expressed, the Company undertake the ordinary duties of carriers for hire, subject to the conditions printed hereon, and their statutory rights;] at a reduced rate the Company carry at owner's risk, and exempt from all liability not occasioned by the wilful misconduct of their servants acting within the scope of authority. In no case will they be liable for injury caused by fear or restiveness of animals; additional rates mentioned in the contract note in each case, or in the Company's published tariff, will be charged for animals declared above the statutory value, and for all other animals above the value of Five Pounds, to which amount only the Company are liable in the absence of a declaration of value. Animals are only carried in conformity with this notice.

5. Through traffic has, for the public convenience, been arranged to places outside and beyond the Company's Line, but the Company will not be liable in respect of traffic outside or beyond their own Railway and the several stations thereof; they undertake to forward, if practicable, traffic destined for places outside their limits to another Company, or to the ordinary carriers or messengers of the district, whereupon their responsibility will cease. Such traffic when consigned to places having continuous and unbroken Railway Communication with this Company's Line, to

be carried by the subsequent carriers on the terms contained in their bills of lading received by them for conveyance of traffic outside their line, will be received and forwarded for the convenience of customers, and to be paid to the parties entitled thereto.

6. In case of traffic forwarded for convenience partly by sea, the Company and all other carriers concerned shall be exempt from any loss or damage happening thereto from the act of God, the Queen's enemies, fire, accidents from machinery, boiler and steam, and all and every other danger and accidents of the seas, rivers, and navigation of what nature and kind soever, in the same manner as if a bill of lading containing such conditions had been signed and delivered by the Company to the consignor. N.B.—The preceding condition shall extend to loss, damage or delay from the negligence of officers, servants and crews of the sea carriers, other than acts of wilful misconduct.

7. The Company do not pledge themselves to the time of starting or arrival of their trains, or those of companies with whom they have through transit, nor do they undertake to carry by particular trains, nor in time for any particular market or special purpose, being only bound to receive and carry with reasonable diligence having regard to the ordinary and usual traffic on their line, and the means for the time being available at their respective stations for forwarding traffic. In no case will they be liable for special damage arising from circumstances peculiar to the customer or the particular case.

8. No claims in respect of goods will be allowed unless made within three days after delivery to the consignee and delivery will be considered complete after a *Bond Ado* offer to deliver by the Company, or in a reasonable time to a consignor, after arrival has been sent to the consignee, when the latter is bound to remove, and all consignments whereof delivery is not to be made by the Company or is not accepted by the consignee, will, at the expiration of twenty-four hours, after notice to the consignee of arrival, be held by the Company not as carriers but as warehousemen, and at owner's risk and subject to reasonable storage charges, which in case of goods remaining in trucks will be charged by way of demurrage at 2s. per truck per day, and same rate of demurrage will be charged in all cases of trucks ordered by customers, and by them or their agent's default not loaded and despatched within twenty-four hours after same shall have been ready for loading.

9. All goods are received subject to the Company's general lien, both for carriage thereof, and all other charges against the customer, and in case said general lien be not discharged within a reasonable time, will be sold by the Company by auction or otherwise and the proceeds applied in satisfaction of such lien and expenses. Perishable articles, when refused by consignee, or of which Company cannot, with reasonable diligence make delivery by reason of insufficient directions, or not paid for and taken away within 12 hours after arrival, if addressed to be left till called for, will, if the Company think fit, be forthwith sold by auction or otherwise without further notice, and the proceeds after deducting freight charges and expenses shall be accepted as equivalent to delivery.

10. The above conditions are to be read divisibly as independent and cumulative terms, and so as that the Company's rights under each shall in no case be taken away by the existence of any other of them, and so as that the validity of each shall not be affected by the invalidity (if any) of the others, and each separate condition is to be read divisibly so as that the valid portion thereof shall not be affected by the invalidity (if any) of the remainder, and any of the above terms which as applied to the facts of the particular case in which same shall be relied on is lawful and reasonable, shall be binding on the parties in such particular case, notwithstanding that same if applied to other cases might be unlawful and unreasonable.

11. No credit can be allowed; but all goods must be paid for, other previously to or at the time of delivery, and if payment is refused, the charge for re-delivery must be also defrayed in addition thereto.

12. Any Servant of the Company taking more than is stated on this Ticket will be dismissed.

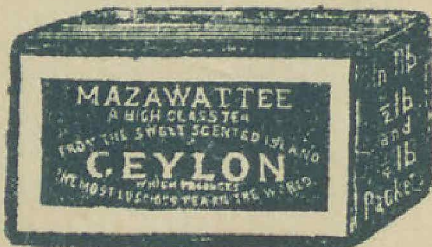

COPY of MINUTES of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians at Meeting held on Saturday the 16 day of April 1892

PRESENT: In the Chair, Colonel Daly - Subsequently Major Rogers
 Other Guardians: Messrs. Michael H. Burke, Pat Kennedy, John Glynn, Michael Lally & Francis Burke
 Mr. Lynch - Absent but attended last time previously to the Board's assembling

The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 4983 to No. 1 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Outdoor Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 1 to No. 1 inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of the Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:

That having inquired into the matter in dispute between Contractor Kennedy and the Master on a/c of Milk deficient he considers the deductions made by the Master are correct but suggested to him for the future to enter on each occasion in the Contractor's Pay Book the fact of any fine or deduction for Milk deficient or not registering 10 degrees of cream and to state the sum deducted.

Approved of the 4th inst
Collector Hyde attended on the 4th inst and took up his new Warrants for collections having perfected his Bond and also lodged a sum of £30 in the National Bank in the names of Colonel Duff, Chairman Board of Guardians, Messrs. Dow and John Smith and John Herrell his Trustees. The Deposit Receipt for the amount is in his (the Clerk's) possession. Advertisements have been issued for the appointment at next meeting of a Collector for the Athlone District and for a Skilled Nurse to take charge of Fever and other contagious cases in the poor Hospital.

Mark Hoare, to come in himself or let his family out, otherwise he would be prosecuted.

The Pater having appeared before the Board stated that on his going over with a patient this day to the Hospital he was engaged by Sister Magus in charge there for previously stopping a messenger from the Out-patients going over to the Hospital, that he did so stop this person in discharge of his duty - not to allow any unauthorized person to go across the House without first having obtained the permission of the Matron; he also stated that the children from the Convent constantly visit his House each day, and that he is unable to take down their names as they refuse to give them - merely stating that they were going over to the school.
