In the office of Poor Hospital Nurse Applications were read from M^{rs} Catherine Keyes and M^{rs} Maria Keyes. The testimonials of each candidate having been fully considered, M^{rs} Keyes was declared elected, and the Clerk directed to call on her to take charge immediately.

Rose Gurney was appointed sempstress to aid in the making of the clothes for the females and spits for the men and boys at the rates set forth in her tender.

A document was read from certain Rate payers in the Craig Abbey Electoral Division, objecting to granting out-door relief to a recipient named, Lydia Collins, on the grounds of not being destitute. Mr. Officer Whelan was directed to inquire into this case and report thereon.
