I believe they were justified under the circumstances in employing and paying these men for their services. But there can be no doubt, that the Clerk of the Union had arranged with them, that 10^s for each Division would be fair remuneration; this would give £4 to Connolly and £3 to McElan, and I must disallow the £3 overpaid to each of these officers.

Do not consider that the Guardians have any power to deduct the amount paid to the Relieving Officers for the work they did from the amount to which Collector

Collector Blake will be entitled under the Franchise Act, but Mr. Blake recognizes that these officers did some of his duty, and has agreed that the amount I have disallowed should be paid out of the money to which he is entitled, and as I believe the work has been well done I will permit this arrangement, and the Clerk will thus arrange the disallowance.
