The Clerk laid before the Board a letter written to the Chairman, Col. Daly, by the Rev. Mother General of Mercy Loughrea, stating that the Ambulance presented some years ago by the Most Rev. D. Duggan for the conveyance of the Sick from the Hospital, is now undependable broken, and that His Lordship will get it repaired, if there will be some guarantee given that it will not be used except for the Sick, and that it might be given in charge of the Hospital Nurses.

The Board approved those arrangements.

 50192/92 Letter from Same, dated 23<sup>rd</sup> December 1892 - referring to the House and its occupant, Situate at Staplenaney - reported on by the Med. Officer of Health for the Ballymun District and drawing the attention of the Sanitary Authority to Secs 110 to 114 of the Public Health Act and to the Housing of the Working Classes Act 1890 as to their power to deal with Houses which are unfit for human habitation.

A communication in reference to the foregoing case having been received from the Sergeant in Charge of the Police Station, Quinsignadden, descriptive of the wretched state of this poor man's dwelling, and his belief that he is often, for days, without food, and that his case should be at once looked after otherwise the consequence may be serious, adding "I write to the Rel<sup>d</sup> Officer about this matter."

On 25 November got but so far as I know there has been no notice taken of my communication. Acting Rel<sup>d</sup> Officer, Curry, was called before the Board and stated that on the 30<sup>th</sup> he had the Workhouse van brought out for this man & his residence, but the refusal to come into the Workhouse that he thereupon provisionally released him, and he has been in receipt of Out Door Relief since.

Upon the application of Mr. Pate, Surveyor the Board agreed to him a cheque for £11.10.0 being the balance due him on ap<sup>l</sup> of the Ballymun Mill, as certified by Mr. Kemper & Co.
