The Board at the Meeting of the 25<sup>th</sup> ultimo approved of the Relieving Officers paying this sum and now request the Local Government Board's sanction to their doing so under the circumstances of this Man becoming destitute in the Ballinasloe Union and brought into this Union Hospital where he is at present a patient.
