In reference to D^r Blackton's several letters the facts appear to be that during the period of the Relief of Distress Act a loan was obtained on reasonable terms for the improvement of the Sewage of the town of Woodford - a public sewer was constructed emptying - after being purified - into the river at the further end of the town. Acting on the representation of D^r Blackton as Medical Officer of Health, Drains for certain private Houses were subsequently made - having connexion with and emptying into the public sewer outside. This arrangement at the time the steps prescribed by Sec 25 of the Public Health Act were not taken, and the expense thereof not since repaid either by Owner or Occupier. Under those circumstances the Board consider it unfair to the several other Ratepayers in Woodford that they should bear any part of the expense of effecting Sanitary improvements benefiting certain individuals only, and they respectfully urge that the definition of sewer in Section 2 of the Public Health Act does not apply to those cases, and that consequently the Sanitary Authority are not bound to keep those private Drains in repair
