Your Committee beg leave to report that they attended at the Workhouse on Thursday the 5<sup>th</sup> Inst and took "stock" of the clothing in use and in store that day.

On comparison with the clothing Receipt Book there were only a few trifling discrepancies between their figures and those in the totals of the Book referred to, the principal being 4 Sheets and 1 pair Blankets deficient in the articles handed over to the late Porter, P. Finnegan, and which the Master reported on the 26<sup>th</sup> August last as not forthcoming - as well as other articles referred to by him. The Committee leave to your board the mode in which <sup>you</sup> will dispose of this deficient stock, the late Porter having given under his hand, at the time of last stock-taking that he had those several articles of Bedding, and for which he, or rather his sureties are now responsible and bound to make good.

Your Committee having carefully gone over the ~~several~~ several articles before them and got the good separated from the bad recommend that the following be condemn<sup>d</sup> =

flagged with Malbay flagging, a sufficient

fall throats to carry off the surface water  
and refuse matter, and take up the paving  
stones which are objectionable for retaining  
nuisances, filth &c. On the date of the visit  
of your Committee they learned from the  
Matron that the adult occupants of the  
Female Infirmary Ward and Nursery number  
20118, subclassified as thus.

that those poor helpless creatures cannot
