Showing that it would appear that this man's complaint of neglect of duty cannot be sustained, and that the only his family had reason to complain of not being visited regularly; but that the Relieving Officer should have made more careful inquiry into Whelan's circumstances before recommending the Board to afford him relief so soon after his return from Galway, where it was known he had brought money home with him; setting forth certain discrepancies between his "Application and Report Book" and "Out door Relief List" requesting the Guardians to caution Mr. Connolly, that if any carelessness in the discharge of his duties is established against him on any future occasion he will not be allowed to retain his appointment.

Mr Charles H. Cameron Report on his analysis of the Water used in the House was read as follows.

This Water is pretty clear and bright, and of fairly good flavor. It contained a few suspended particles and micro organisms. It was fermented with pure Sugar for a week, at a temperature of 80°. It had become very slightly clouded. Under similar conditions bad Waters become turbid from development of fungi (moulds), from & yeast, and the best Waters remain unaltered.

It will be seen by reference to the printed report note that the amounts of albumenoid and saline ammonia in this Water are somewhat excessive; the Water is not therefore of the best class, but it is a tolerably good one.
