As regards River Lane this is a free hold, the cabins being built on the Bed of the old River, and it would be impossible to do anything with them to put them in a proper sanitary condition. The Corporation of the River Rossmore has been called on to see to it and do whatever is necessary to it.

We understand that on Chapel Street there is an underground sewer running for a considerable distance. Repairs to the Pump here, been put in hands and a contract has been declared for same.

As regards Hospital accommodation if the necessity should arise, an iron one could be put up on very short notice, and in the mean time any cases could be sent into the Workhouse Loughrea.

The Water Supply is better from a part of the Lake which is a very long way from the part which adjoins the town, and where very strong springs rise up and flow towards the town where the outlet of the Lake is, and therefore there cannot be much if any fear of Contamination from the town.

As regards Hospital accommodation the Iron Hospital could be made use of, if there were no fever cases, which is often the case, and if this was not available, there is a very large portion of the Workhouse uninhabited, and is quite detached from the inhabited part, which could be put in use on very short notice as the Medical Officer has already recommended.
